Thursday, October 3

“FFH 2019 Kickoff and Social” - 7 p.m., 312 4th Street. Join other history buffs at the Barnard-Stockbridge Museum to see how a former church was transformed into a repository for two renowned photo collections.

Friday, October 4

“Storytelling” - 2 p.m., Wallace Mining Museum. Learn the tricks of the trade of Storytelling from Wallace resident Vicki Allmann, well known for her portrayal of the famous May Hutton.

“A Peek into Dante's Peak” - 3:30 p.m. meet at Sierra Silver Mine Tour. Local historian Mike Feiler will lead this walking tour of filming sites for the hit 1997 Hollywood adventure film, “Dante's Peak.” (limit 25)

“Preservation/Tax Incentive Workshop” - 7 p.m., Sixth Street Theater. Dan Everhart of the Idaho State Historical Society will talk about how businesses may qualify for tax breaks for historic preservation.

“19th Century Warfare & Weapons” - 1 p.m., Wallace Mining Museum. Civil War reenactor and vintage weapons expert James Teague will share his knowledge on guns and battles.

“Cemetery Comes to Life” - Assigned times, noon to 3 p.m., from NPR Depot. Catch a trolley to historic Nine Mile Cemetery where a tour guide will introduce you to actors portraying the notable and notorious of Wallace history. Admission benefits the non-profit Cemetery Association.

“Medical Advances in the late 19th Century” - 3 p.m., NPR Depot. Reenactor Mike Inman will discuss medical advances that resulted from Civil War combat medicine.

“Fans and Frivolity in the 19th Century” - 6 p.m., Wallace Firehouse. A dinner theater featuring “proper ladies” of the Civil War era, in their finery. **Reservations required.** Dinner at 6 p.m.; presentation at 7 p.m.

“Wallace Believe It or Not” - 11 a.m., NPR Depot. Museum curator Shauna Hillman will lead a walking tour of Wallace and dispel some of the common myths. (limit 25)

“Historic Homes and Hot Tea” - Noon to 4 p.m., Reservations required; tour times assigned. Tour four historic Wallace homes, a new museum and a beautiful church, ending with refreshments at the Wallace Carnegie Library. Tours leave from Barnard-Stockbridge Museum, 312 4th St.
